Examination Notes

8 year old neutered Great Dane underweight, start on pressure point sore lhs of tail. Heart and lungs fine, all normal on abdo palpation. Eyes, ears and teeth all fine. Pink mm, normal hydration. Lymph nodes all normal. Habitus good. Eager to eat. Some resistance to caudal extension of left hip and some discomfort along spine. Suspect osteoarthritis due to age.

Underweight

An underweight pet is one that has a body weight lower than the ideal range for its age, breed, and overall health. This can occur due to various reasons such as inadequate nutrition, poor diet quality, underlying medical conditions, or parasites. Being underweight can lead to a weakened immune system, decreased energy levels, and an increased risk of developing other health issues.

Treatment

Deworm and home with 5 days of Hepavet.

Advise owner that as a senior dog is better to feed small amounts of food often.

Tamoltra 1 1/2 q12 for discomfort from osteoarthritis.

Advise thicker bedding to prevent any further pressure sores.

To rv in 2 weeks for weight check.

Recommendations

Underweight

1. Schedule a comprehensive veterinary examination to rule out any underlying medical conditions or parasites that may be contributing to the pet's low body weight.
2. Gradually increase the pet's caloric intake by providing a high-quality, nutrient-dense diet specifically formulated for their life stage and activity level.
3. Consider adding a veterinarian-approved nutritional supplement to the pet's diet to ensure they are receiving all necessary vitamins and minerals.
4. Establish a consistent feeding schedule with multiple smaller meals throughout the day to help the pet gradually gain weight.
5. Monitor the pet's weight regularly and adjust their diet accordingly to ensure they are gaining weight at a healthy pace.
6. Encourage regular exercise and playtime to help build muscle mass and improve overall health.
7. Reassess the pet's progress with your veterinarian regularly to ensure they are gaining weight appropriately and to address any concerns or adjustments needed in their care plan.
