Special conditions in terms of Act 24/35 Sec 7 (d), Read with Amendment Act 4 of 2016 Sec 3C (1) (h):

1. On request, the PAPA licence must be presented to a police officer, including an animal welfare inspector authorised as a police officer in terms of Section 8 of the Animal Protection Act, (Act 71 of 1962).
2. A police officer must be allowed access, in terms of Act 4 of 2016, Section 4, at any reasonable time to a premise, place or vehicle whereby performing animals may be used.

3. When animals under this licence are moved to a facility not listed on this licence, the licencing officer has to be notified 7 days before the intended movement, in line with Regulation 6. This will also be applicable to movements of new animals to this facility.
4. Any restraining methods used on the animals or birds shall not cause pain, injury or suffering and should be supplemented with species appropriate measures to reduce stress
5. It remains the responsibility of the licence holder to feed, care for and house all the above mentioned animals and maintain the facilities, transport and other equipment to meet all the animal welfare needs.
6. The officer has to be informed if there is any change to the number or type of species used.
7. It remains the responsibility of the licence holder to ensure that he/she submits the correct PAPA application form, correctly completed, at least 2 months before a valid PAPA licence expires, to papa@dalrrd.gov.za and Cc papa.els@elsenburg.com. The form is available on the Elsenburg website: <https://www.elsenburg.com/services-and-programmes/veterinary-services-0#s=Performing-Animals-Protection-Act-Licensing>
8. It remains the responsibility of the licence holder to ensure that the facility veterinarian will visit the facility at least twice per year at an interval of at least 4 months apart.
9. The public should not be encouraged to keep wild animals or birds in captivity.
10. Feeding, touching, petting or stroking of wild animals or birds by the public should not be encouraged
11. Feeding, touching, petting or stroking of suitably habituated wild animals by the public should be limited in accordance with approved working plan.
12. Animals must have the opportunity to retreat at will and should not be forced to interact with the public.
13. Animals used for human interaction must be evaluated continuously by a suitably competent person for signs of stress upon which interaction should immediately be terminated. The individual animal or animals must be allowed to retreat to a safe environment (hide) and allowed rest periods without human interference or interaction.
14. Small variation in bird/reptiles/rodents numbers acceptable with natural increase – license has to be amended to reflect true numbers when number stabilise / variation substantial.
15. A step-wise approach should be visible on a sign that explains to the public what should be done when a wild or injured bird of prey is found.
16. A clear sign has to be placed in the “bird contact” section that explains imprinting and the detrimental effects of imprinting of birds and the reasons why they cannot be released into the wild.
17. A clear sign needs to be placed with the tethered birds that explains the welfare reasons for tethering the birds and the consequences that follow if a bird that should be tethered is left untethered.
18. The tethered birds in the “bird contact” section must be able to retreat to a safe area (zone) where human contact is not allowed.
19. A clear sign has to be placed with the tethered birds in the “bird contact” section that prevents the public from touching them if they are in their retreated zones.
20. Animals used for human interaction must be evaluated continuously by a suitably competent person for signs of stress and interaction should immediately be terminated, the individual animal must be allowed to retreat to a safe environment (hide) and allowed rest periods without human interference or interaction.
21. Feeding, touching, petting or stroking of wild animals or birds by the public must at all times be conducted and supervised by appropriately qualified personnel to ensure circumstances are safe for all. This must be carefully monitored and controlled by the licence holder.
22. Animals used in the filming industry must always be accompanied by appropriate PAPA licenced animal trainer(s).
23. To ensure monitoring when animals are used in the filming industry, in line with the amended Performing Animal Protection Act (Act 4 of 2016), read with GNR 771 of 3 August 2017, Government Gazette number 41019, Regulation 5, an animal welfare inspector (AWI) authorised in terms of Section 8 of the Animal Protection Act (Act 71 of 1962) should be present whenever animals are on set or used for filming, to monitor their use on behalf of the licencing officer. The AWI is required to submit a monitoring report to the licencing officer. Animal welfare organisations with authorised AWI include Animal Anti-Cruelty League, Animal Issues Matter, Animal Welfare Society: Philippi, Cape of Good Hope SPCA and NSPCA. It remains the prerogative of the licensing officer to perform an inspection at any time during a shoot in order to comply with Regulation 5 and if an AWI is not present, to bill the filming production at the Treasury approved general veterinary hourly tariff and kilometre fee. Contact details and location to access

appropriate local veterinary care in the vicinity of a filming location in case of an emergency has to be arranged for the duration that animals are on set.

24. *The licence holder can coordinate the use of wildlife species in the filming industry, conditional on the presence of the responsible, species-appropriate, PAPA-licensed animal trainer(s) for those animals.*

This licence is valid from **date of issue** 27 May 2022 until **expiry date** 24 May 2023.
