Comments by Inspector:

On 20 November 2024, we arrived at the sale yard at 09:15 and were greeted by Carl, the manager, and Roelof, a veterinary technician working alongside the State Veterinarian (State Vet). Roelof was accompanied by two final-year vet students. The purpose of the visit was to inspect the condition of various animals and ensure proper welfare standards for transport. Animals Inspected include; Sheep: There were two sheep exhibiting nasal discharge. However, both were cleared by the State Vet's team for transport, Goat: One goat showed signs of mild lameness, but after inspection, it was determined that the animal could still use its leg and was fit for transport. Julian discussed the kid with a watery eye with Roelof and the and it was determined that there wasn't an injury and the kid was fit for transport, Cow: A cow was observed with minor bleeding near the horn base. The State Vet's team confirmed this animal was fit for transport. Carl decided that this cow, due to its aggressive behaviour, would be sent to the abattoir, Injured Sheep: One sheep was found with an injury on its penis. The State Vet's team cleared this animal for transport, The State Vet's Vet Tech confirmed that none of the animals required immediate slaughter. Further monitoring of the loading process was conducted, and Carl confirmed that the injured sheep and the cow with the minor horn injury would be sent to the abattoir for slaughter. Warnings for inappropriate transport were issued under references 1134 and 1135. The inspection was notably improved compared to previous visits, and the welfare of the animals was adequately addressed. We will continue to monitor the ...
